The Alpha Kappa Alpha brand is an ideal, a promise of what the organization represents and what it means to those who engage it. The development of brand meaning is a deliberate process to infuse tangible and intangible qualities into the Sorority that differentiates it from other organizations. The qualities that define the Alpha Kappa Alpha brand are excellence, community-based, global, collaborative, and creative. In addition, our brand is characterized as optimistic, confident, knowledgeable, thoughtful, and spirited. Below are some guidelines that will ensure Alpha Kappa Alpha remains a strong and meaningful brand.

**Messaging.** All messages (flyers, posters, correspondence, speeches, etc.) should reflect the Sorority's brand meaning. Written communication should be conversational, as if speaking directly to, not at, the recipient. Avoid the use of terms that are unique to Alpha Kappa Alpha. A brief description of Alpha Kappa Alpha, also known as boilerplate, should be included at the end of press releases and other external communication. The appropriate language can be found in the full brand guidelines.

**Fonts.** Appropriate for formal printed communication, the Georgia font conveys a sense of friendliness and a feeling of understanding. Georgia's sister font, Verdana, is ideal for communication that will primarily be read on electronic devices. The width and spacing of Verdana's characters makes it very legible on the screen. Regardless of medium, use Greek letters when using the abbreviation AKA.

**Colors.** The Sorority's official colors are Salmon pink and Apple green. For professional printing, Pantone 182 (pink) and Pantone 354 (green) should be used. If printing from a personal computer, use RGB codes R243, G176, B177 (pink) and R168, G218, B97 (green). On websites and other online platforms, use Hex codes F3B0B1 (pink) and A8DAA1 (green). Do not alter, obscure, substitute or rearrange the order of the colors in the coat of arms or administration logos in any way.

**Photography.** Primary photographs (appropriate for most communications) should feature undergraduate and graduate sorors engaged in community service. They should be action-oriented, focusing on the specific tasks sorors are performing versus posed, group pictures. Service recipients and community partners should be included, if releases have been obtained.

Secondary photographs (appropriate for limited audiences and specific activities) should focus on sorors engaged in social settings such as fundraisers, sisterly relations activities, etc. Highlight the interactions between sorors and convey a kind and caring connection. Limit images that play on stereotypes (e.g. stepping, posing, etc.) and avoid images that cast sorors or the Sorority in a potentially negative light (e.g. drinking, sexually-suggestive dancing, provocative clothing, etc.).

This focus on "counting toward equity rather" than "creating a culture of equity" is basically a form of white privilege that allows administrators and policymakers to show incremental "progress" and avoid more substantive action toward real equity that changes the culture(s) of institutions with longstanding racial histories that marginalize some and privilege others. Issues in higher education are still raced from white perspectives and suffer from a view that race and racism occur in a vacuum. Some literature suggests that racism begins very early in the student experience and continues all the way to college (Berlak & Moyenda). This mis-education, mislabeling and mistreatment based on race often develops as early as five to ten years old and "follows" them to postgraduate education and beyond.

Watching today's students "holding themselves in because they had to get A's not only on tests but on deans' reports and recommendations," Helen Lefkowitz Horowitz, author of the highly praised *Alma Mater*, began to ask, "What has gone wrong—how did we get where we are today?" *Campus Life* is the result of her search—through college studies, alumni autobiographies, and among students themselves—for an answer. She begins in the post-revolutionary years when the peculiarly American form of college was born, forced in the student-faculty warfare: in 1800, pleasure-seeking Princeton students, angered by disciplinary action, "show pistols . . . and rolled barrels filled with stones along the hallways." She looks deeply into the campus through the next two centuries, to show us student society as revealed and reflected in the students' own codes of behavior, in the clubs (social and intellectual), in athletics, in student publications, and in student government. And we begin to notice for the first time, from earliest days till now, younger men, and later young women as well, have entered not a monolithic "student body" but a complex world containing three distinct sub-cultures. We see how from the beginning some undergraduates have resisted the ritualized frivolity and rowdiness of the group she calls "College Men." For the second group, the "Outsiders," college was not so much a matter of secret societies, passionate team spirit and college patriotism as a serious preparation for a profession; and over the decades their ranks were joined by ambitious youths from all over rural America, by the first college women, by immigrants, Jews, "townies," blacks, veterans, and older women beginning or continuing their education. We watch a third subculture of "Rebels"—both men and women - emerging in the early twentieth century, transforming individual dissent into collective rebellion, contending for control of collegiate politics and press, and eventually—in the 1960s—reordering the whole college/university world. Yet, Horowitz demonstrates, in spite of the tumultuous 1960s, in spite of the vast changes since the nineteenth century, the ways in which undergraduates work and play have continued to be shaped by whichever of the three competing subcultures—college men and women, outsiders, and rebels—is in control. We see today's campus as dominated by the new breed of outsiders (they began to surface in the 1970s) driven to pursue their future careers with a "grim professionalism." And as faint and sporadic signs emerge of (perhaps) a new activism, and a new attraction to learning for its own sake, we find that Helen Lefkowitz Horowitz has given us, in this study, a basis for anticipated the possible nature of the next campus generation.

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
