**Directions:** Read each scenario. After reading the scenario, specifically describe the amendment and the reasons why the scenario was a violation (or not) of our Bill of Rights. Use complete sentences.

**Scenario 1**

Tara, an eighteen-year-old college student, is accused for stealing a classmate's test paper and selling it on the Internet. When she appears before the judge, she asks for a lawyer to help defend her. The judge tells her if she is smart enough to be in college, she is smart enough to defend herself. Besides, she is not being charged with a felony, so the stakes are not very high.

**1<sup>st</sup> Amendment** - This amendment guarantees all also that he pay in all civil cases in which the value of the dispute is more than \$25.

**Scenario 2**

A neighbor is using the Joanses' basement a time to the Joanses' yard fell on their roof during a hurricane. The neighbors want the Joanses' family to pay \$100 to have their roof repaired. Mr. Joans requests that a jury be present to hear this case. The judge says it is not necessary since the amount of the repair is so small. The Joans family lives in Washington D.C.

**7<sup>th</sup> Amendment** - This amendment guarantees all a right to a trial by jury in all civil cases in which the value of the dispute is more than \$25.

**Scenario 3**

Carolyn is accused for shoplifting a candy bar from a neighborhood convenience store. At trial, she is found guilty. The judge decides that the appropriate punishment is to cut off Carolyn's hands so that she will not be able to shoplift again.

**8<sup>th</sup> Amendment** - This amendment protects us from cruel and unusual punishments. Cutting off someone's hands for petty theft certainly would be cruel and unusual.

**Scenario 4**

Mr. Reynolds, an avid hunter, spent the day of his leave one day to find again from the forests of Alaska, Tobacco, and Firearms outside. They inform him that certain provisions of a new federal law allow them to confiscate his rifles so that he may not engage in terrorist activities or plot against the United States government. They have no evidence that he is connected to any such activities.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment** - This amendment guarantees all the right to bear (possess) arms (guns). This right can be taken away.

**Scenario 5**

Your science teacher asks the class to exchange papers to correct last night's homework. Your friend, Jamie, refuses to do so and is angry to the principal.

**10<sup>th</sup> Amendment** - The Supreme Court has ruled that this is constitutional in a 2012 ruling.

**Scenario 6**

Irene, a fourteen-year-old student, decides to protest the war in Iraq. She wears a T-shirt to school with a picture of the White House and the caption "Weapons of Mass Destruction" (the principal pulls Irene aside and asks him not to wear the shirt again because it is disruptive to the learning environment. Irene wears it the next week and is suspended from school for three days. The Supreme Court has a previous decision stating that asking a student to wear a commercial shirt and/or punishing them for it is in fact unconstitutional if it negatively affects the learning environment of others.
