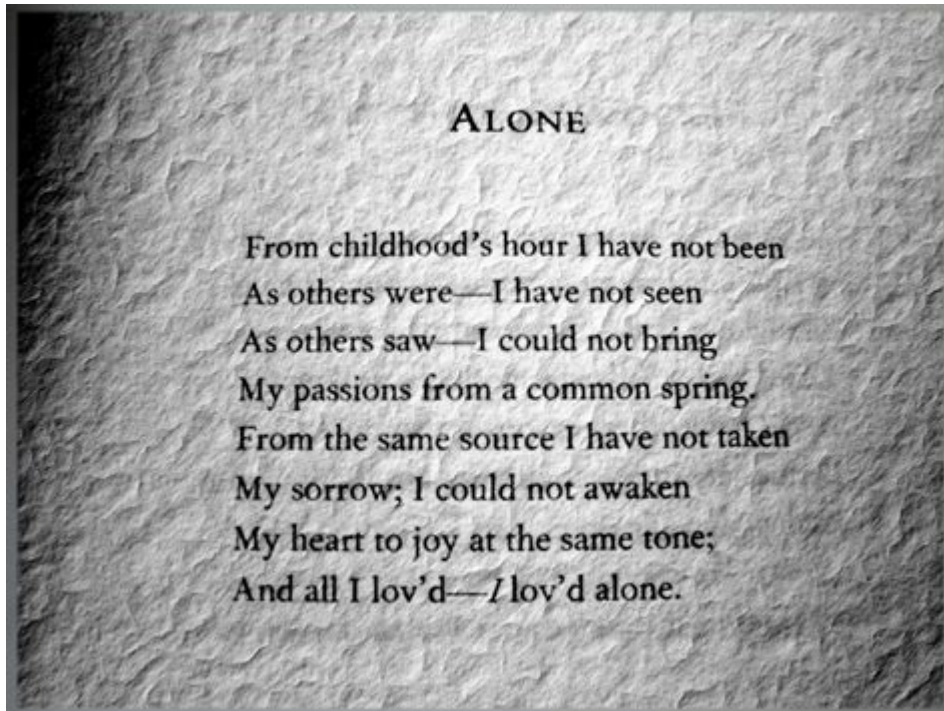

Poe did not invent the genre; he was following a long-standing popular tradition. Poe's literary career began in 1827 with the release of 50 copies of *Tamerlane and Other Poems* credited only to a Bostonian, a collection of early poems that received virtually no attention. In December 1829, Poe released *Al Aaraaf, Tamerlane, and Minor Poems* in Baltimore before delving into short stories for the first time with Metzengerstein in 1832. His most successful and most widely read prose during his lifetime was *The Gold-Bug*, which earned him a \$100 prize, the most money he received for a single work. One of his most important works, *The Murders in the Rue Morgue*, was published in 1841 and is today considered the first modern detective story. Poe called it a tale of ratiocination. Poe became a household name with the publication of *The Raven* in 1845, though it was not a financial success. The publishing industry at the time was a difficult career choice and much of Poe's work was written using themes specifically catered for mass market tastes.
