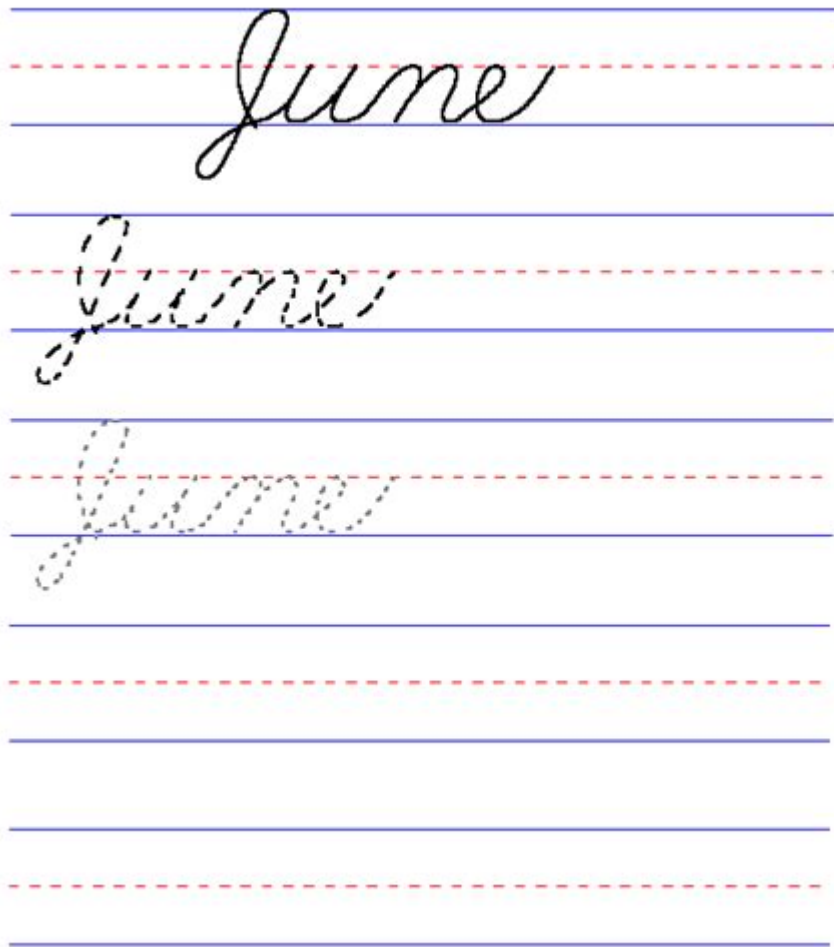

Given this picture, the nature of our susceptibility to digital devices becomes clear, along with the possibility of how to break their spell. Full of practical actions that we can start taking right away, *Your Stone Age Brain in the Screen Age* offers compelling evidence that we can change the way we use technology, resist its addictive power over us, and take back the control we have lost.
