General Practices

Use great care when writing about identity. This guide is not one size fits all and is meant to be applied on a case-by-case basis depending on tone, channel, audience and content. Often, language boils down to individual identity, which brings up the overarching principle of this guide: Consult with the individual to determine how they would like to be referred.

- Use language in accordance with the individual's identity.
- Be specific and avoid generalizing identity groups.
- Avoid the use of pejoratives. However, exceptions can be made for quotations if relevant to the content.
- The origins of seemingly innocuous idioms or words may be racist, sexist or ableist in nature, such as "cake walk," "peanut gallery," "grandfather clause," "tipping point," "rule of thumb" or "bonkers." Consider the origins of everyday language before freely using it in communications.
- Avoid reinforcing deficit narratives that place people as victims of societal problems and myths that ignore systemic barriers, as both prop up negative stereotypes. Instead use truth-telling about those deficits and barriers.
- We all make mistakes. Give yourself grace, reflect and consider ways to acknowledge any unintentional harm that may have resulted. For tools on inclusion, respect and accountability, visit [Building Inclusive Communities](#).

Understanding Inclusive Language at MSU

Inclusive language goes beyond simply avoiding offensive terms; it actively promotes respect, dignity, and belonging for all individuals. At MSU, this commitment is reflected in our values of diversity, equity, and inclusion. Using inclusive language is not merely a matter of political correctness; it's a fundamental aspect of creating a positive and productive learning and working environment. This guide aims to provide a framework for understanding and implementing these principles in your daily interactions.

What Makes Language Inclusive?

Inclusive language recognizes the diversity of our community and avoids perpetuating harmful stereotypes or biases. Key aspects include:

Person-first language: Prioritize the person over their disability or condition (e.g., "person with autism" instead of "autistic person," although this can depend on individual preference). Always prioritize individual preference whenever possible.

Gender-neutral language: Use inclusive terminology that avoids gender assumptions (e.g., "they/them" as a singular pronoun, "chairperson" instead of "chairman").

Avoiding ableist language: Refrain from using terms that demean or stereotype individuals with disabilities. Focus on abilities and contributions rather than limitations.

Culturally sensitive language: Be mindful of cultural differences and avoid language that could be perceived as offensive or insensitive to particular groups.

Respectful terminology: Utilize respectful and accurate terms for all identities, including sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, religion, and socioeconomic status.

Practical Examples of Inclusive Language

Let's look at some concrete examples to illustrate the principles discussed above:

Instead of: "The fireman rescued the cat." Use: "The firefighter rescued the cat."

Instead of: "He is a hard worker." (assuming gender) Use: "They are a hard worker." or "This person is a hard worker."

Instead of: "Crazy" or "Insane" to describe behavior Use: "Unpredictable," "Erratic," or describe the specific behavior.

Instead of: "The handicapped parking space" Use: "Accessible parking space."

Common Challenges and Considerations

Implementing inclusive language isn't always straightforward. Here are some common challenges and how to address them:

Pronoun Usage:

Choosing the correct pronouns can sometimes be difficult. When unsure, politely ask the individual how they prefer to be addressed. Avoid making assumptions or forcing a particular pronoun on someone.

Microaggressions:

Microaggressions are subtle, often unintentional acts of discrimination. While not always explicitly harmful, they cumulatively create a hostile environment. Be mindful of your language and its potential impact.

Keeping Up-to-Date:

Language evolves, and what was considered acceptable in the past may not be so today. Stay informed about current best practices and be open to learning and adapting your language accordingly.

Then, she addresses the importance of dealing with emotion, attitudes, and motivation by suggesting ways to change students' mindsets about ability and by providing a range of strategies to boost motivation and learning; finally, she offers guidance to faculty on partnering with campus learning centers. She pays particular attention to academically unprepared students, noting that the strategies she offers for this particular population are equally beneficial for all students. While stressing that there are many ways to teach effectively, and that readers can be flexible in picking and choosing among the strategies she presents, Sandra McGuire offers the reader a step-by-step process for delivering the key messages of the book to students in as little as 50 minutes. Free online supplements provide three slide sets and a sample video lecture. This book is written primarily for faculty but will be equally useful for TAs, tutors, and learning center professionals. For readers with no background in education or cognitive psychology, the book avoids jargon and esoteric theory.
