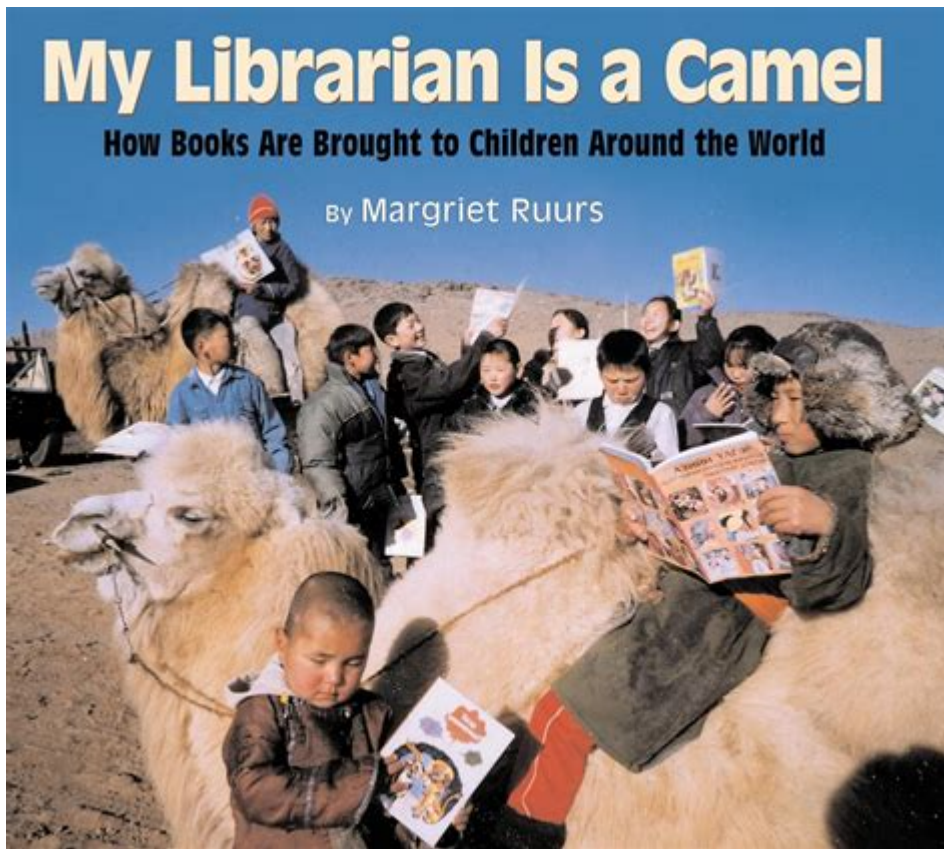

While young girls throughout the African Diaspora can relate to getting their hair braided in intricate styles, it is also an ancient ritual that is a large part of their history. my librarian is a camel: Mi bibliotecaria es un camello (My Librarian is a Camel) Margriet Ruurs, 2015-09-29 Cuando pensamos en una biblioteca, nos imaginamos un edificio en una calle o tal vez una sala en una escuela.
