Preparations for the conference began 18 months earlier with the designation of a steering committee and the establishment of a dedicated, p-manent web site. The meeting took place on October 22 and 23, 2007 in Bethesda, Maryland and was co-moderated by Susan J. Mandel and Edmund S. Cibas.
