And he writes of the "daytime serial's unwed mother," Irna Phillips, a Chicago wannabe actress (a Margaret Hamilton of the shtetl) who created radio's most seminal soap operas—*Today's Children*, *The Road of Life* among them—and for television, *As the World Turns*, *Guiding Light*, etc., and who became known as the "queen of the soaps." Hers, Heilbut writes, was the proud perspective of someone who didn't fit anywhere, the stray no one loved. *The Fan Who Knew Too Much* is a revelatory look at some of our American icons and iconic institutions, high, low, and exalted.
